#### Warning

This fact sheet aims to let you know the side effects most commonly seen following the administration of your treatment. Please note that when you take any medication, there is a possibility that it causes rare side effects and it is difficult to predict which patients will be affected.

# General Information for Patients Carboplatin and Pemetrexed

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# General Information associated with your treatment

- > These medications are used to prevent the multiplication of abnormal cells and destroy them.
- A blood test will be done prior to every treatment. Depending on its results and side effects of the previous treatment, the dose of the medication might be adjusted or the treatment might be delayed.
- You may experience fatigue during your treatments. This is usually only temporary and may be related to different reasons (medication, stress, the disease). Maintain a good level of activity but rest when you feel the need to.
- > Your **appetite may diminish**. Eat more often, in smaller quantities.
- > Your **sense of taste may be altered**. Enhance foods with herbs or lemon juice. Eating fruits, and non sugared candies, chewing non-sugared gums, etc., may mask the metallic taste.
- > Alcohol (in small quantities) is permitted and will not affect the efficacy of the treatments.
- You can have an **active sexual** life during your treatments. Your partner will not be exposed to, nor harmed by chemotherapy effects. However, a decrease in your sexual drive may occur during this period. This may also be influenced by different factors (fatigue, stress, etc.). Furthermore, do not forget that you must use appropriate methods of contraception as this medication may cause **birth defects** or fetal death. Notify your doctor immediately if you had unprotected sex or if your partner is pregnant.
- > For male patients, the sperm count may be affected and negative effects on the embryo may occur. In fact, the production of spermatozoids may be reduced or completely absent during treatments. In certain patients, this reduction of fertility may be permanent, may get better or return to normal after the treatments have stopped. This reduction of **fertility** does not prevent erection or sexual activity. A pregnancy remains possible. If you have sex with a woman of childbearing age it is strongly recommended to use a method of contraception during the treatment.
- > In **pre-menopausal female patients**, chemotherapy may cause irregularities or cessation of the **menstrual cycle** during treatments. The menstrual cycle may restart or return to normal after the end of treatments. It may also stop permanently. However, a pregnancy remains possible and chemotherapy administered during pregnancy may harm the embryo. A birth control method is strongly recommended during treatments. Breast-feeding is contra-indicated during treatment.
- Consult your doctor or pharmacist before you take other medications (even over the counter medications available without a prescription) or natural health products. These may provoke an interaction with your treatment and diminish its efficacy or increase side effects.
- Be sure to always have on hand the **complete list** of **your medications**, dietary supplements, vitamins and other natural health products. Give it to your doctor and your pharmacist. It is important to make them aware of any change.
- Follow the instructions given by your cancer center about the right way to handle and dispose of biological fluids (for example urine, stools) in order to protect the environment and your relatives.

Ulcers in the mouth and the throat may appear approximately 7 to 10 days following the start of your treatment.	<ul> <li>Gently and regularly brush your teeth after each meal and at bedtime.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>Rinse your mouth with a solution of water and salt with or without baking soda. Gargle 4 times a day – after every meal and at bedtime. Do no drink or eat for one hour after you gargle.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>Mouthwashes without alcohol found in stores are also useful.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>If you notice ulcers, redness or painful areas in your mouth, contact a member of your healthcare team.</li> </ul>			
A <b>skin rash</b> , usually mild, may occur following your treatment. It generally involves the trunk, the arms and legs and might be associated with itchiness.	<ul> <li>Dexamethasone will be prescribed to decrease this effect.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>If this occurs and bothers you, consult a member of your healthcare team who will recommend appropriates measures.</li> </ul>			
Rare adverse effects that can be severe or serious to communicate quickly to your doctor				
If you experience <b>cough</b> and/or <b>persisting fever</b> and sudden <b>shortness of breath</b> .	<ul> <li>Communicate immediately with a member of your health care team or go to the Emergency Room.</li> </ul>			

## **Special Considerations**

You have been prescribed two medications to be taken all along your treatment. Folic Acid has to be taken orally once a day and Vitamin  $B_{12}$  is an intramuscular injection to be administered every 9 weeks. It is important that you take them in order to decrease certain adverse effects of pemetrexed. These medications have to be started one week prior to the start of your treatment and up to three weeks after the completion of your treatment.

Check with a member of your Oncology team before taking anti-inflammatory medications like ibuprofen (Advil<sup>®</sup>, Motrin<sup>®</sup>) and naproxen (Aleve<sup>®</sup>), since they can modify the effect of your treatment.
